#### A post-pandemic future arrives

Most DKG members have taken advantage of the opportunity to get their COVID vaccines, either because of their teaching circumstances or because they have met age eligibility. Now that all members can receive the vaccine, chapter leadership is examining its postpandemic future.

How shall meetings be organized (virtual, in-person, hybrid)? What helps members connect to the chapter and participate in its program of work? If your meeting attendance was down last year during Zoom meetings, why was that? What do members value about in-person DKG activities and meetings? What programs and topics would you find most engaging?



These questions and others are part of a survey members are asked to complete by the end of June. The survey is available on the chapter web site home page. Once down loaded, members can respond to the questions and then send them in to Dr. Sandra Cross. Answers will be

used by the Educational Excellence/Program Committee to plan "meetings" and topics for the 2021-2022 year.

No one planned for the year of the pandemic and it definitely had negative impact on the lives of many. But it also presents the chapter with the opportunity to reassess and re-envision itself. It invites serious conversation around what makes DKG important, encouraging members to re-invest and re-kindle the energy that makes DKG chapters work. Survey authors Cross and Kathy Caldwell, co-first vice presidents, are asking members to give thoughtful responses so that Alpha Sigma Kitsap serves the needs of its members, noting that "we do know we want to be able to learn, visit, serve and continue to be together this [coming] year."

# **Outstanding Educators 2021**

Fourteen Kitsap County educators were recognized as Outstanding Educators on April 27, 2021 in a Zoom ceremony attended by over 75 colleagues, friends and family. Bearon Old Coyote and the Song and Dance Group from Chief Kitsap Academy opened and closed the event with original music of welcome and celebration. Old Coyote and the students honored the educators for the hope they bring to students. Chapter president Andrea Neault spoke about the challenges educators faced this past year and thanked the Suquamish and S'Klallam People for

making COVID vaccines available to school personnel.



In her address to the group, Poulsbo Mayor Becky Erickson complimented teachers for their dedication and outstanding performance this past year as they adapted to the difficult teaching circumstances presented by on-line instruction to perform "miracles" in learning. U.S. Congressman Derek Kilmer shared his commitment to educational legislation that recognizes the professionalism of educators and the need to support their work with students facing trauma, food insecurity, and homelessness as well as academic challenges. He identified some of his former teachers as "superheroes," and classed the individuals being recognized by DKG as similarly deserving of our admiration and support.

Deputy Superintendent Erin Murphy, from the Bainbridge Island School District, discussed the challenges presented to all educators during the pandemic and how everyone quickly

stepped up to find innovative ways to create meaningful remote/virtual lessons for their students. The fourteen honorees were all commended for their extraordinary efforts during these trying times.

This is the eleventh year that the DKG chapter has honored local educators. "We are so proud to be able to recognize these educators who give so much of themselves to our children," explained DKG President Neault. "This event is a small show of appreciation for the work they do." Over 200 educators have been recognized since the program began in 2011. Honorees were nominated by administrators or fellow teachers and selected on the basis of their record for exemplary teaching, student success in the classroom, leadership in education and community service. This year's recipients came from both public and private schools.

Stephanie Codorniz special education, and Shayla Sharlow, grade 4, at West Hills STEM Academy, Bremerton School District, were honored for their contributions to creating a positive environment for learning. Sarah Buck and Penny Irvin, both special education teachers from Armin Jahr Elementary, Bremerton, were commended for their "whatever it takes" attitudes and ability to use multiple pathways to increase student learning.

Pine Crest Elementary, Central Kitsap School District, teachers Amy Horan, a reading specialist, Ann Kim, grade 4, and Abigail Schuette, special education, were recognized for their collaboration and creativity to include all students and families during on-line instruction. Klahowya family and consumer sciences teacher Shannon Steedman also went out of her way to make on-line access and alternative learning available to her students, including opening her labs for hands-on work.

Kelley Daniels and Averil Story, who teach kindergarten at David Wolfle Elementary in the North Kitsap School District, were honored for the engaging curriculum strategies they used during on-line teaching and for their collaboration. Rebecca Neeley, career technology and American Sign Language instructor from Kingston High School, North Kitsap School District, serves as a role model for students with disabilities and an advocate and mentor for many students of diverse needs.

Megan Feeney, special education teacher/coordinator at Chief Kitsap Academy, Suquamish Tribal School, was commended for establishing meaningful partnerships with parents to accomplish learning goals for students. Eric Bockelie, who teaches criminal justice courses at the West Sound Skill Center, and Bainbridge Island High School math teacher Lisa Hale were hailed for their relationship-centered teaching styles and for focusing on equity for all students.

Starbucks regional manager, Katie Akers, shared the company's support for public education and the work of local teachers by providing each honoree with a Starbuck's gift card. Starbuck's support is greatly appreciated, acknowledged Outstanding Educator Committee member Mary Jensen. The chapter also appreciates the commitment of the committee, which included Jensen, Kelly Rosenbach, Erin Murphy and Carol Linscott, chair. Outstanding work on their part to make the virtual event special.

# Member profile: what the State Strategic Action Plan research found

This space is usually dedicated to featuring one of the Alpha Sigma Kitsap members, sharing her talents, her story and passions as an educator and some facts that might not be known—a way to get to know members and build community. This edition, however, is focusing on the statistics about women educators in Washington State. It presents a picture of members who might be, of the vast opportunity in our state to seek new members. It invites the reader to put names to these numbers and to begin the membership nomination process.

As part of the process to develop a 5 year Strategic Action Plan for Washington State DKG, the planning committee collected and analyzed data from member surveys and statistics from a June 2020 OSPI study. The latter reported on the number of women actively working as educators in Washington State. The data was reported in terms of both teachers and administrators, by ethnicity and by grade span. Below is listed the data for the northwest region of the state (ESD 114, 121, and 189), covering the Olympic and Kitsap Peninsulas, King and parts of Pierce

County and counties west of the Cascades up to the Canadian border.

The Chi Cowlitz County Chapter has formed a partnership with a local community college to offer mentoring, training and presentations to students. In exchange, the college personnel have become engaged with and members of their chapter. Those and other "outside the box" strategies could result in significant growth for DKG. The women are there!

## "Legislative" Update:

There is a new committee at the State DKG level focused on Education Policy and Legislation. The committee was added to the state structure when approved through By-law change at the Spring 2021 Convention.

The purpose of the committee is to support advocacy for women's, children's and educational issues; to promote involvement in non-partisan legislation regarding women, children and educational issues; and to inform members of legislation through non-partisan communications.

The committee formalizes a role that has become increasingly important in the state over the past biennium, recognizing that taking a more proactive role in advocating for education policy and legislation is both consistent with DKG purposes and makes state actions more relevant and visible.

A new Advocacy Handbook is now available on the WA State DKG website to assist members in examining proposed legislation and coaching them on effective testimony writing and delivery. See <u>https://www.dkgwa.org/advocacy.html.</u>
